- Public Opinion Strategies and Hart Research conducted a Michigan statewide mixed mode (phone and text-to-web) survey of N=600 registered voters on behalf of ACS CAN.
- The survey was conducted July 11-21, 2024.
- The margin of error for a sample of N=600 registered voters is +/- 4.0% at a 95% confidence level.

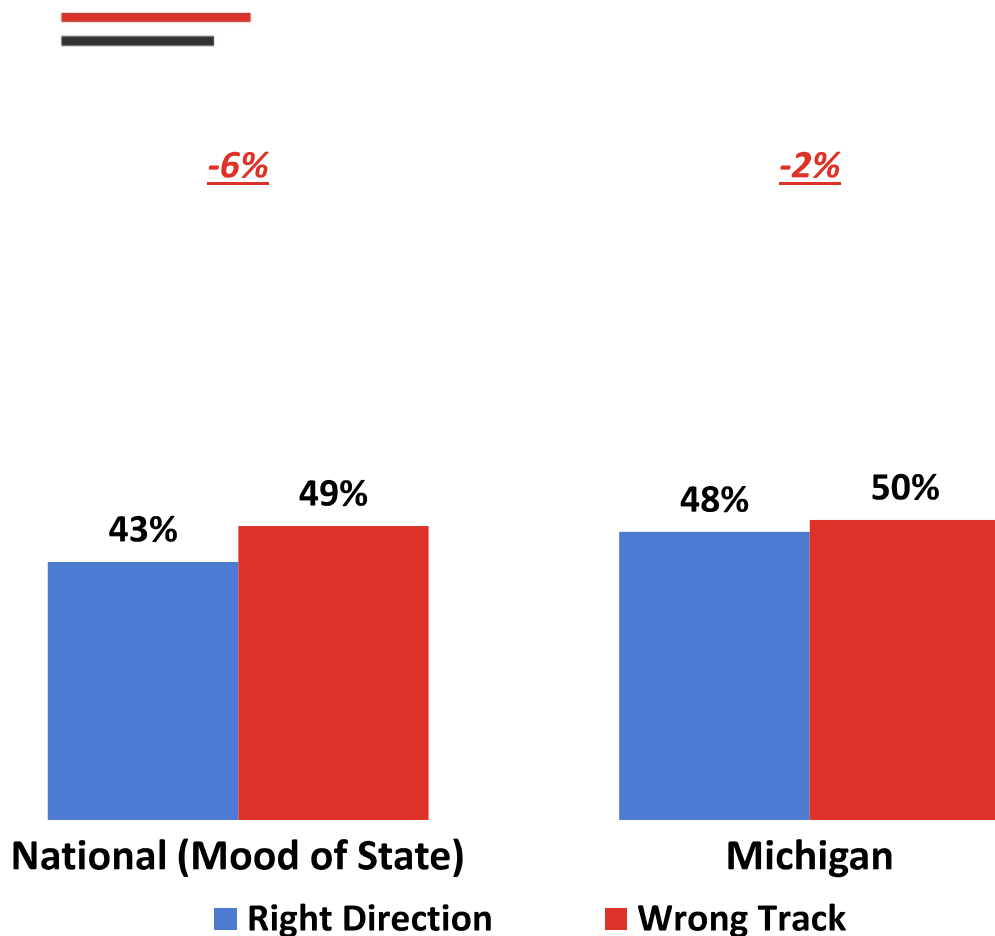

Michigan Data: The top issues consistently across demographic audiences in Michigan are inflation, protecting democracy, and immigration. For voters of color, men, and Republicans economy/jobs is also important. For younger voters and college educated voters, affordable health care coverage is important.

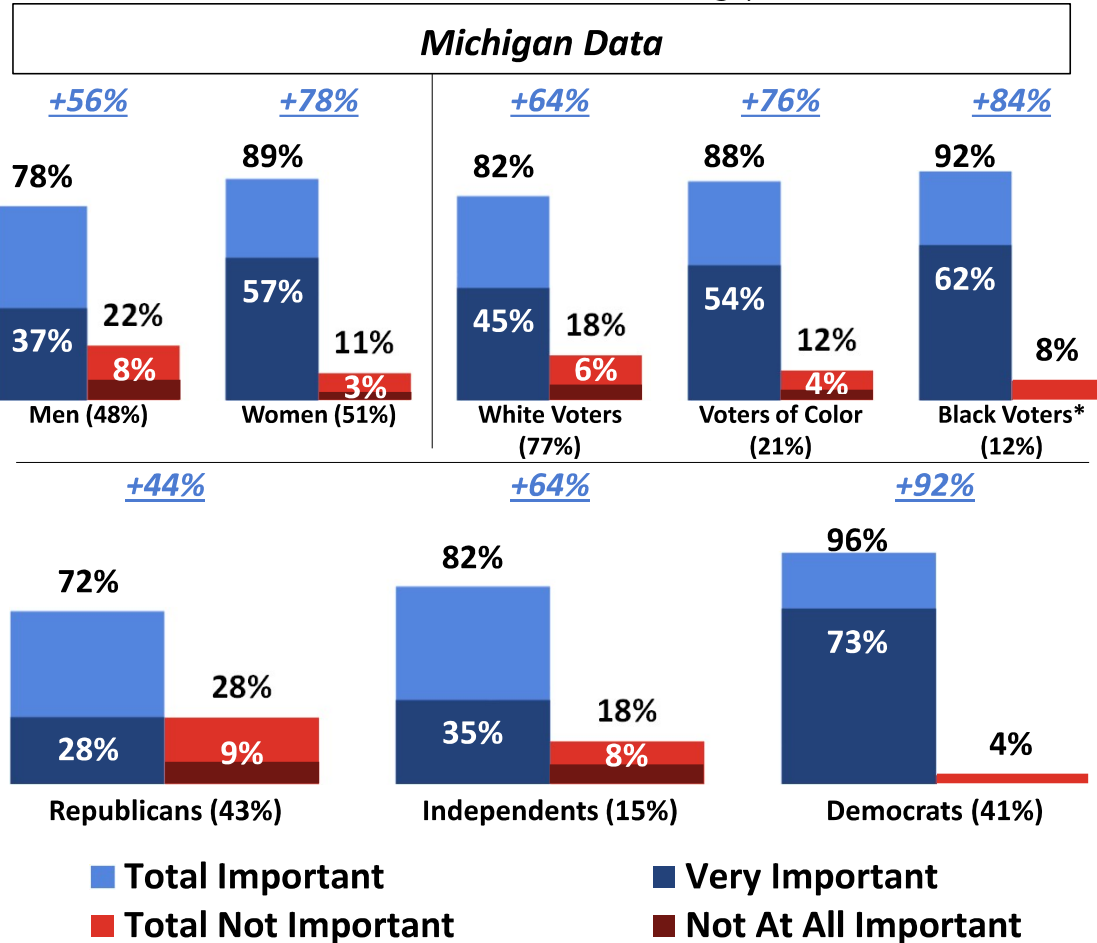

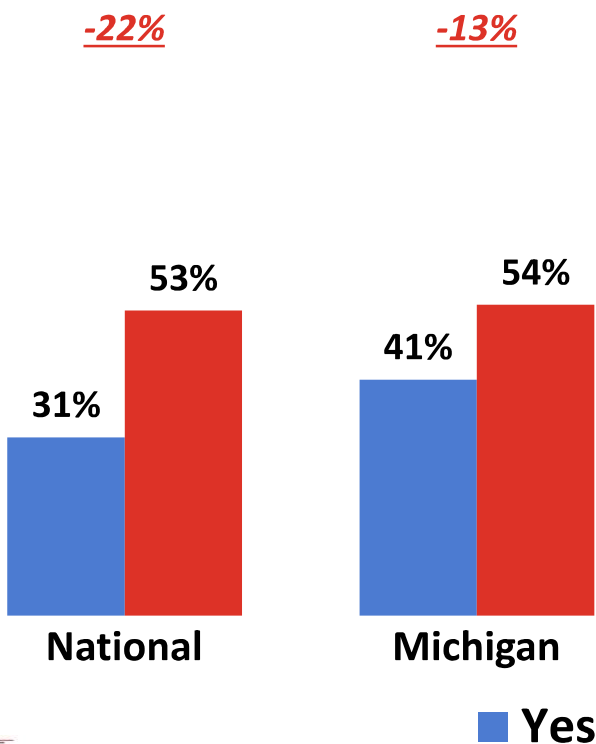

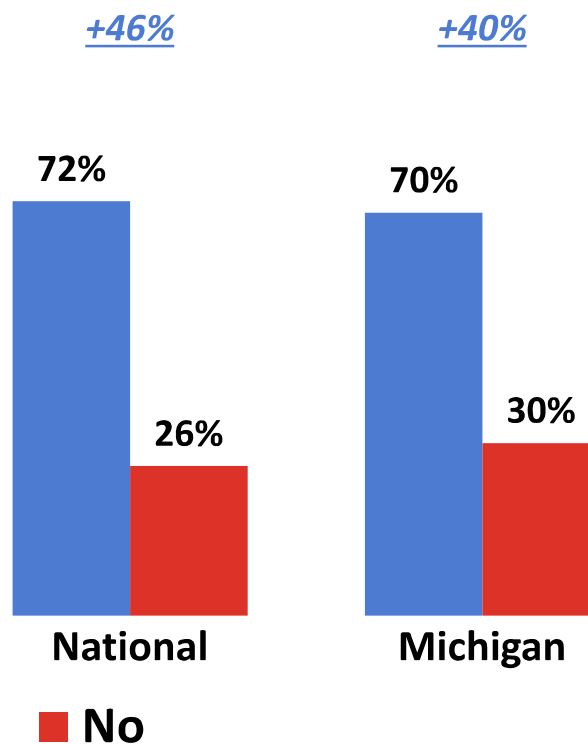

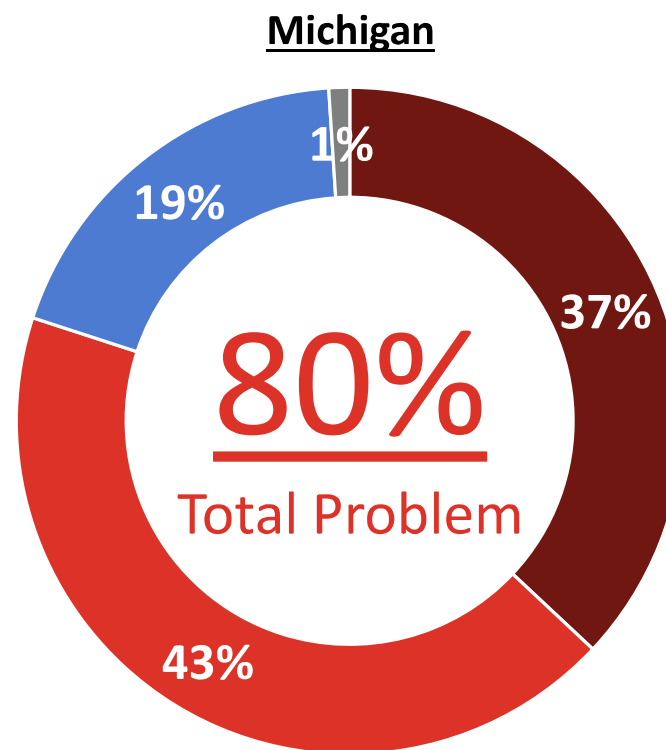
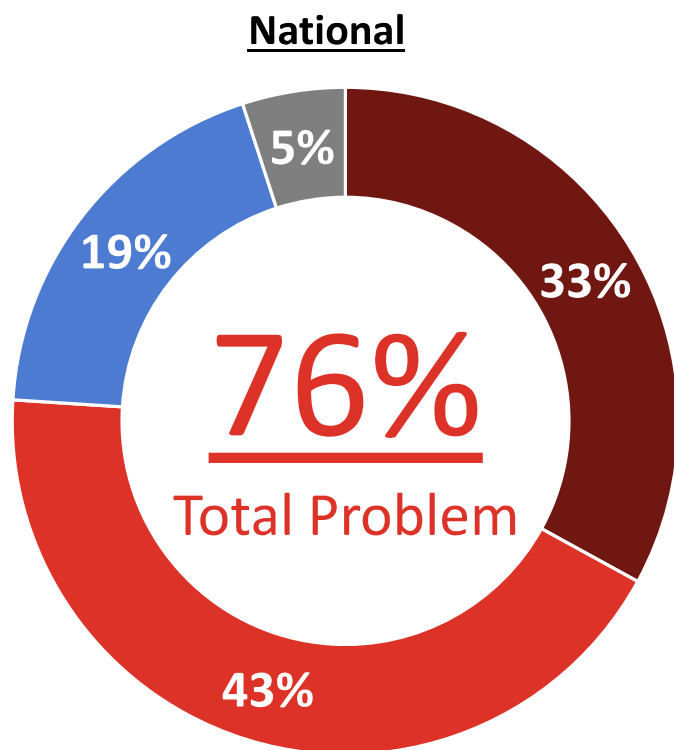
How much, if at all, do you believe having access to medical care, like doctors and hospitals, is a problem where you live?

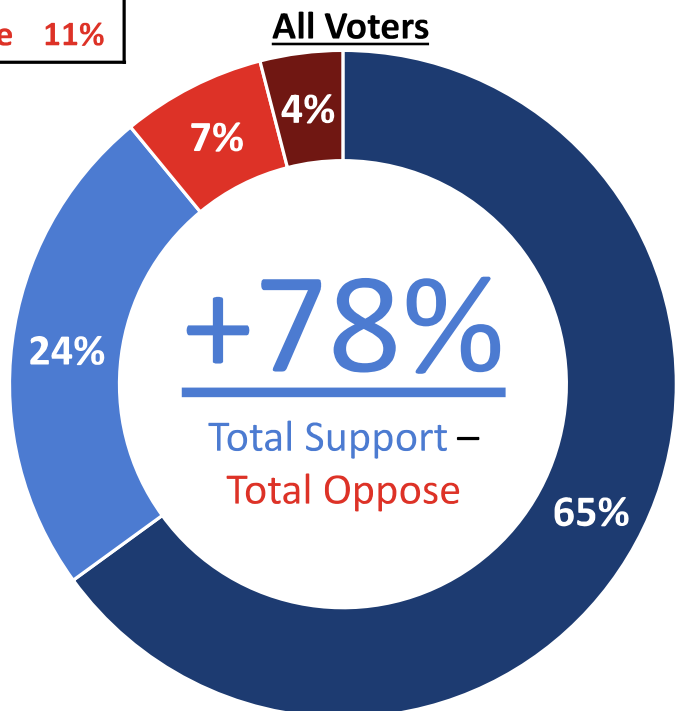

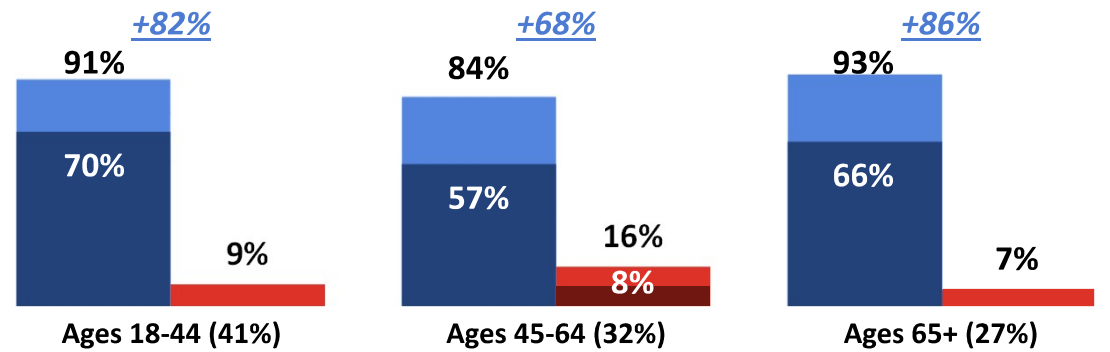
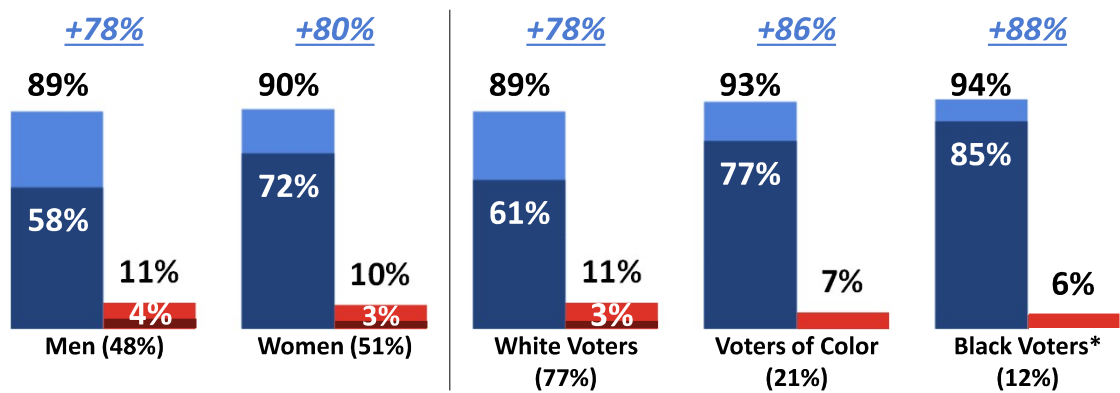

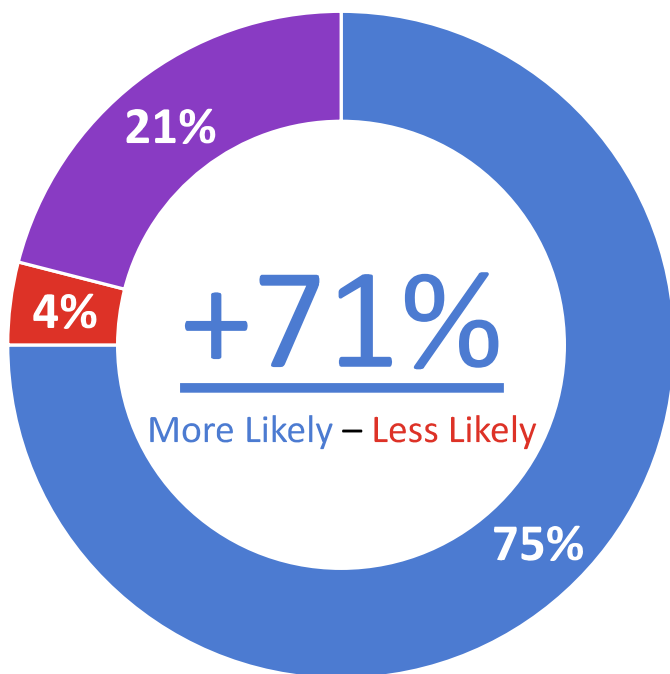

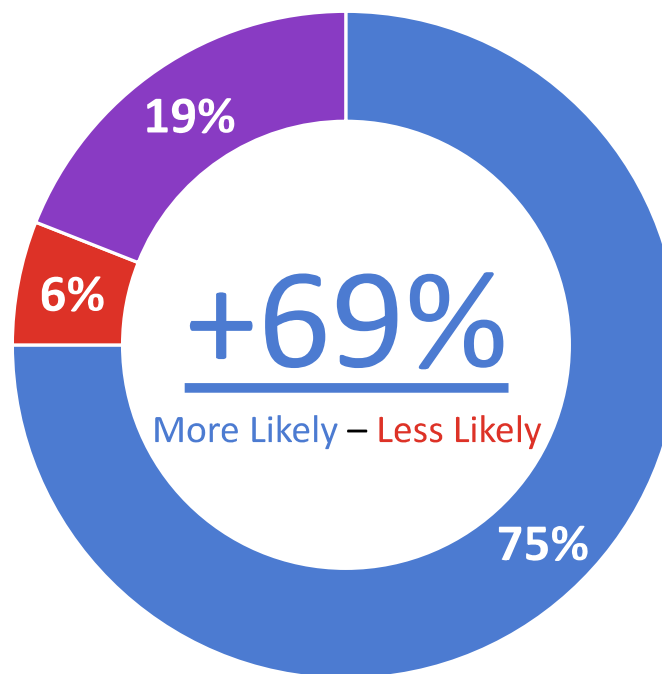

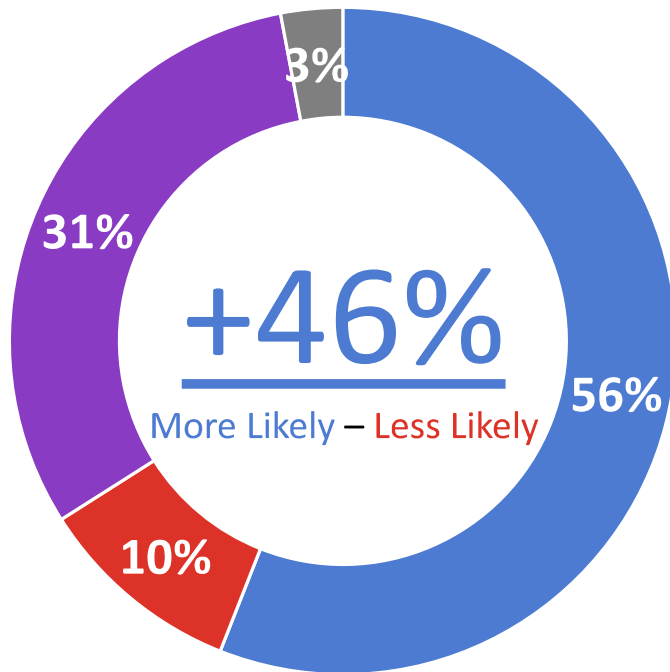

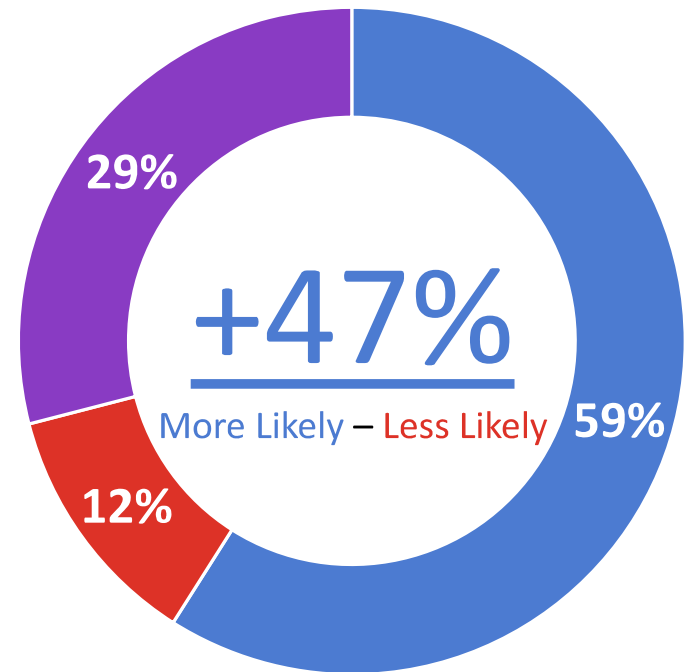
